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


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Big Cat goes to Germany




M.A.N museum and you'll get photos of the exhibits.

Hanne keeps a few hens so there is always fresh eggs for breakfast. She is a domestic technology teacher and teaches cookery and the various design



technologies that go under that umbrella such as fabric design, pottery needlework etc. On her last visit to Carlisle, she was very impressed with the Be-Ro cook book Elaine uses so we sent her a copy for ideas in her classes. Elaine still uses the one

her mother gave her; some things in life just cannot be bettered though technology will always try to convince.

Our first full day started with a long walk into the woodland just above their housing estate. These are great amenities, usually every one has a resident Elmer Fudd! No pesky wabbits here!



We took a basket and set off deep into its heart to pick mushrooms. It was breathtaking the sheer amount of fungi growing there. Obviously to the untrained eye many are very dangerous but we didn't need to worry as Hanne was taught by her parents which to pick. The light in the woods wasn't dark or even that shaded, in fact it had an ethereal quality; a sort of phosphorescence and apple green that painted a picture of elves and wood

spirits so quiet that voices seemed muted.

MAJOR JAGUAR GATHERING /"FATHER'S DAY" SHOW HAREWOOD HOUSE, 21 June 2015

In the absence, yet again, of a JEC Northern Day, the JEC Yorkshire Ridings Region is proposing that interested northern JEC regions/JDC areas support a pre-existing major classic car event at the excellent Harewood House venue (Leeds to Harrogate road A61/A659, near Wetherby) on Sunday 21 June, 2015. It is already a significant "Father's Day" general classic car event attracting nearly a thousand vintage & classic cars, with big clubs like Mercedes-Benz UK treating it as their major annual day. There is entertainment and a full arena programme, with prizes in many categories, is surrounded by motor dealer displays, car-related stands and collectibles, craft & specialist food stalls.



Major sponsor is the Yorkshire Post. Harewood House is one of the "Treasure Houses of England"; designed by Robert Adam & John Carr and built between 1759 and 1771. The spectacular interior features Chippendale furniture and Turner paintings, whilst the grounds were styled by Capability Brown. There are lakes with a water cascade and stepping stones, exotic bird garden (penguins, flamingos, parrots), tearooms, garden centre and extensive kids' adventure playground.

For many years, JEC Northern Day at Harewood House was a true gathering of the regions including North East, Yorkshire, Cumbria, Lancashire, Derbyshire and Cheshire as well as some of the Scottish regions. We can support this show as a significant Jaguar/Daimler gathering in the expectation that it may lead to a replacement/re-instated JEC Northern Day. Apparently, tickets (at reduced prices) are purchased en bloc from the Yorkshire Post, so it would be a huge benefit if those interested would put their names forward......all Jaguars & Daimlers welcome, no matter how old, or new. Each dealer gets an allocation of four visits per year for their customers.

The visits are very popular and Newcastle Bentleys allocation is already fully subscribed for 2015. The Dealer Principle suggested that as it's a club visit I contact Bentley direct and gave me details of their Events Manager.

The people at Bentley explained that due to the overwhelming demand for visits they stopped factory tours for the general public and clubs / societies around two years ago. They only arrange visits for their customers and unfortunately can't accommodate us.

So that's that. – At least we tried.

New XE - Jaguar open day event



On Sunday 8th March Jaguar dealers across the country held their first viewing of the brand new Jaguar XE and I was fortunate enough to be invited to the preview event at Lloyd Jaguar, Carlisle.

First impressions, - the car is instantly recognisable as a Jaguar as externally it looks remarkably similar to the current XF, which to me is no bad thing. It looks like a large car, similar in size to the XF although we're assured that it's almost a foot shorter. The wheelbase is only three inches smaller than the XF, meaning the overhangs at the front and rear of the car are much shorter and the distance from the front of the dashboard to the windscreen is significantly shorter than the XK which also helps to maximise interior space.






With the front seat fully extended, interior space for the driver is similar to the XF, but as a function of it's sporting style, it's clear that rear space is compromised and a little tight in terms of rear headroom. I suspect my Vauxhall Insignia offers more

room overall, although at 6'3" tall maybe it's not the fairest of tests and I'm sure that "normal" people won't have too much of a problem.

The new XE is pitched directly at the likes of the BMW 3 Series, Audi's A4 and Mercedes C Class. Dimensionally there's little difference in terms of length and wheelbase, although the Audi is the longest overall but interestingly has the shortest wheelbase. Having said that, I've thrown in a wild card with the Vauxhall. I'm not suggesting it's of the same class as any of the other cars in this segment, but non the less it's larger dimensions do make for an interesting comparison.

The interior of the XE has a quality feel, but is perhaps a little "busy" and totally different to the much cleaner approach used in the XF. Whether or not it's up to the standard of the BMW, Audi or Mercedes is perhaps debatable and a matter of personal opinion.





Overall it's a fine looking car and should sell well in it's sector. Given the prestige of the Jaguar brand, the base XE model with it's low emissions, the incredible fuel economy from it's brand new Ingenium engine and relatively low price is sure to steal sales from it's direct competitors but also from the likes of Ford, Vauxhall and Volkswagen's top specification offerings. In fact three orders were taken in the two hours we had been there.

Overall I think Jaguar has a winner on it's hands, It's sure to outsell the underrated X Type and it's introduction will inevitably help to sustain the Jaguar brand for years to come.


