2 APOLOGIES: NONE.

3 CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS: GILL WELCOMED THE COMMITTEE TO THE FIRST MEETING OF 2017, AND BID THEM ALL A HAPPY NEW YEAR. SJC Treasurer Report – Feb 7th 2017 Committee Meeting #152

- Due to the SJC January break and a decision to postpone committee meetings in late 2016, this is the first Treasurer's Report since October 2016.
- 2. As of February 7th, the Solway Jaguar Club has a membership of 65 as we have no new members and the end of the membership year is now moved to May. This includes one honorary member. We also keep one member in the club membership without fee due to his ill health.
- 3. Following the SJC Committee, decision to make the AGM the start/end of the membership year members paying by Standing Order and Direct Debit were reminded to re-set these from January to May. One member has reported that he was too late to change his SO but this money will be held in the club account to the start of the 2017/18 year. Similar arrangements will be made for others who did not make these changes with their banks if they wish SJC to do this.
- Payment receipts and expenditure made to and by the Club in Nov/Dec/Jan resulted in a net decrease in club funds of £235.40 due to the payment for wine at the Christmas meal in the Ladore Falls Hotel, a



£60 donation to charity (SOBS) and a drink at the Committee lunch in January.

- 5. At the Feb meeting, the Treasurer brought in 'Welsh' Jaguar 2017 calendars for the members to take home for the sum of 50p each. We raised £18 for club funds.
- 6. The Treasurer is currently providing the monthly Regional News submission for Cumbria to the JEC magazine. If any member who is both a member of SJC and JEC would like to take over this duty then please contact me.



I have enjoyed my time as the events coordinator, which I admit has given headaches at times but overall a great sense of satisfaction with the added privilege of working with the current committee.


At the February club night I was asked by a member to give a brief resume of

1972 Daimler Sovereign Series 1. Beige with red interior.

This is a very original and low mileage (58,500) and seems to be rust free. Excellent original interior. Excellent chrome and good paint, having had a



full respray. Bill mentioned that one of the gauges is not working, but the car comes with a second complete dashboard. £3,000

1989 Jaguar XJS V12. Dark blue with parchment interior.

Very low mileage (47,500) and in excellent condition throughout. I have done an underbody corrosion protection on this car and can confirm it is in excellent rust free condition underneath. £8,000

1964 Jaguar Mk2 3.8 MoD.

Cream with beige interior and painted silver wire wheels.

Good running condition, very original and pretty rust free underneath due to being imported from South Africa. Interior has been retrimmed in vinyl at some point in the past. All the chrome is good to reasonable and the car looks fairly presentable throughout. Some blistering on LH front wing, but otherwise the paint is pretty good. Typical Moss gearbox offers a super smooth when correctly timed, but with the usual crunch on second if rushed. The engine pressure drops on tickover when hot, but pick up with engine speed and the engine has plenty of power and no knocking on start up.

This would make a great running restoration or just used and enjoyed as is as it has been for the last twelve years or so. £10,000

Jaguar XJ40 4.0 S metallic red with cream interior.

Superb rust free body and low mileage (52,000). This car is in fantastic condition throughout with virtually unblemished paintwork and exterior. When I drove back to mine the gearbox light came on (since gone out) and the oil pressure dropped slightly on tickover (hot). Engine is quiet and smooth with plenty of power. £3,000



Northumberland – or bust!!

A little before Christmas I bought our second Jaguar XK – a 1998 platinum coloured XK8 coupe – from a lovely lady in Shap village. During January, I checked most areas of the car and replaced a couple of suspension bushes, the thermostat and the water pump. After an oil and filter, service 'R339 HDW' was ready for anything! Moira had planned a visit to our youngest (Charlotte) in Newcastle for her birthday at the end of January, followed by a 4-day walking break in Northumberland. (Yes, we are completely bonkers!) This was the fourth time we've had a winter break on the Northumberland coast so all our warmest clothes were packed. With temperatures around 2 -3°C it made a lot of sense to take the XK8 coupe instead of its XKR convertible stablemate. We set off on Jan 30th – a freezing cold morning with boot and back seat full.

The morning after a delightful evening celebrating Charlotte's birthday we set off for Northumberland. The photo to the right is R339 HDW outside our home for the next 4 days - a cosy and warm barn conversion on the outskirts of Alnwick. Needless to say having somewhere warm to stay was essential – after all, this was early February!





Over the next few days we took in a couple of coastal walks that provided the amazing sight of huge golden sand beaches with only the two of us there. The coastline also has superb castles — we saw some of the finest, Alnwick Castle (Harry Potter), Dunstanburgh



Castle and my favourite, the imposing Bamburgh Castle (photo).

A trip to the tiny coastal hamlet of Low Newton by the Sea on a cold, damp afternoon gave us a spectacular view of Dunstanburgh Castle and a chance to get warm in the 18th century Ship Inn pub for a pint from its microbrewery. All the beers have great names such as 'Red Herring', 'Sea Coal', 'Indian Summer', 'Sandcastles at Dawn' and 'Dolly Daydream'. Sadly, they had finished serving lunch so it was a bag of crisps each!



Another coastal walk started in Seahouses so to get us off to a good start we dropped into The Olde Ship Inn on the harbour side for a coffee. The place is virtually a sea museum stuffed full of genuine nautical artefacts from sailing boats and steam ships – they even have the nameplate and voice tube from the paddle steamer 'SS

Forfarshire' of Grace Darling fame. However, the sign in the main bar made me smile:

It was strange to see lots of the fishing vessels (plus those that ferry visitors to and from the Farne Islands in spring and summer) perched on the harbour wall for the winter. I guess this allows maintenance and repair of

these tough little boats.





It is at this point that you are about as close to the Farne Islands as you can get on the mainland.

On such a clear day the white painted lighthouse on the nearest of the Farne Islands looked spectacular. Hope you can see this in the photo to the left of Moira, who is basking in the warm sunshine. The gloves and scarf are



to prevent sunburn!

One of the days proved a little too, cool and we visited 'Barter Books' in Alnwick. Inside the Industry

Peugeot/Citroen (PSA) To Buy GM Europe (GME)?

No doubt about the lead story this month! News broke around the middle of February that PSA were in advanced discussions to buy GME, or Vauxhall/Opel to you and I. Of course GM have been keen to see the back of their European business for a long time now. It hasn't turned a profit this century. Last year's loss was \$300M, but the average loss since 1999 has been about \$1.25 Billion a year, over \$20 Billion in total. I wrote a few years ago that the only thing stopping GM closing all its European operations was that a massive financial loss would mean no bonuses for the top management team for about 5 years, by which time they'd be retired on much reduced pensions. Cynical but true I believe.

So why would PSA be interested? That's a hard one. It's only a few years since PSA themselves were rescued from bankruptcy by both the French Government and a Chinese conglomerate taking shareholdings and injecting capita. As one industry analyst said this week: "Two drowning men don't make a swimmer". PSA has global ambitions but Vauxhall/Opel only operate in Europe? GME currently have around 6.7% of European car sales, PSA have 9.9%. The trick, if they can pull it off, is to maintain around the combined 16.6% of sales whilst dramatically cutting costs.

Cutting costs means closing factories. GME employ 38000 people, 19000 in Germany and 3500 in the UK. UK plants are most in danger because of the weakness of the £, because nobody is sure if it's a good place to make cars after Brexit, and because bluntly UK redundancy costs are about one third of those in Germany. And German unions have the legal power to veto the deal. With the French Government being a 14% shareholder in PSA French plants are unlikely to be the ones to close.

So it looks like very bad news for those employed to make Astras in Ellesmere Port and Vivaro vans in Luton, plus the thousands more employed in the supply chain and dealerships.

New Car Price Increases Make Used Cars Better Value



UK new car buyers have shelled out an extra £2 Billion because of average price increases of over 5% since the Brexit vote last June. This partly because of the fall in the value of the £, partly because manufacturers are trying to reduce discounts so they don't go the same way as Vauxhall/Opel.

New car depreciation in the UK is on % terms the second highest in the World. On average e new UK car will be worth 48% of new retail price after 3 years and 35000 miles. In China the same car will be worth over 70% of new price.

As ever you have to take these things with a pinch of salt. The figures are based on depreciation from retail price. With discounts of 15-20% and often more being commonplace, true depreciation is nothing like that bad. However with modern standards of reliability a 35000 mile car is hardly a risky purchase. So last year over 8 million used cars were sold in the UK. And there's plenty more to supply the requirements. Record sales of new cars over the last 3 years mean record numbers of 1-3 year old cars coming back into the market this year.

It was thought this could cause severe problems of oversupply, but these fears are now easing. With new car prices continuing to rise a reduction in new car sales means that more buyers will turn to used. Certainly Pendragon, UK's largest used car seller through its Evans Halshaw and Stratstone brands thinks so. Currently they sell 5% of the used cars in the UK, about 400.000 a year. They've announced plans to open 40 new used car centres in the next year. Rumour has it one in Carlisle.

Insurance Costs Put The Brakes On Driverless Cars.

I was recently told by a senior Audi executive that they expected to be selling fully autonomous cars in the UK by 2020 "if the insurance problem can be solved". The "insurance problem" is the question of who is responsible if a driverless car has an accident? Is it the driver (who probably wasn't driving), the other driver if there is one, the manufacturer, or the authority maintaining the road layout. It seems likely that the owner of the driverless car will be required to take out insurance that covers all four possibilities, which will be costly. As more autonomous cars come on the roads these costs will almost certainly fall, but unless a solution is found there seems no doubt this difficulty will slow things down for a while.



Early 2017 New Car Sales Start Strongly

Whilst it's widely expected that UK new car sales will slow after March the industry got off to a good start in January. Total sales were 3% up on last year and private sales 5%. Petrol cars outsold diesels for the first time for a long time, evidence of how this change is gathering pace I think?

Amongst the German prestige manufacturers BMW as expected after their massive December pre registrations did badly with 8500 sales whilst Audi achieved 11700. Both were soundly beaten by Mercedes at just over 13000, 10% ahead of last year. Can Merc keep it up? - time will tell.

European sales were even stronger, almost 10% up on 2016. Mercedes now leads Audi and BMW across Europe for the first time for a very long time.

Manufacturers Move Away From Diesel?

As I said last month this will be a slow process, but it seems that manufacturers are accepting there is no point in throwing millions at trying to develop diesel car engines to meet what are now the environmental requirements. Many (myself included) thought that as so often happens necessity would be the mother of invention, but there now seems a growing belief that this won't happen.

In fact the development funds are going into electric and hybrid power. In 2009 there were only 6000 electric cars in the whole World, these spread across 40 countries. By 2015 there were 1.2 million. And this growth in spite of barriers of cost and range. BP recently forecast there will be 100 million electric cars on the roads of the world by about 2030 as costs come down and range improves. At which time the problem becomes generating the enormous amounts of electricity required to recharge all these cars.

Costs are coming down principally because battery prices are dropping. Batteries account for a third of the cost of an electric car, so £8-10000 for a small one. Or of course you can buy a small petrol or diesel car for that!

Battery prices fell by 35% in 2015 and a further 22% in 2016, and these reductions are predicted to accelerate. It's expected that within 5 years electric cars will be the same price as internal combustion ones WITHOUT



any Government subsidy. With all the environmental pressure there now is it's likely these subsidies will continue making electric cars cheaper than petrol or diesel to buy, and of course cheaper to fuel and maintain.

Range is still a problem for all but Tesla, but it is improving. And it's a question of horses for courses as well. In big cities electric cars and vans are pretty practical now for most users. Where I live in the Lakes they are not currently (forgive the pun!). It's those hill things that are the problem. A neighbour who runs a Mitsubishi Hybrid reckons he gets less than 20 miles range before having to switch to the petrol engine. But technology can advance at a fantastic rate. I see that Toyota are experimenting with solar panels on the roof now, and why not?

It's Official – 2017 WRC Cars ARE Too Fast!

Sorry to stray into sporting matters again, but I couldn't resist a follow up to the article I wrote a couple of months ago expressing concern that the 2017 WRC cars would be too fast for the roads they travel on, leading possibly to a major accident that could have dreadful consequences for the sport.

In the recent Swedish Rally Ott Tanak steered his M Sport Fiesta to fastest on one stage at an AVERAGE speed of 86 mph. This threw the FIA observer on the event into a panic, and he insisted that the second running of that stage be cancelled. So what did the FIA do next? Admit they should have known that if they allowed the cars to have more power, better traction, and improved aero they would be faster, and promise to do something quickly to sort the problem?

Not a bit of it! They blamed the organisers for choosing roads that were too fast and issued an instruction to all WRC events to select slower roads or risk dire consequences. Nice to know the governance of our sport is in good hands!




